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Why do we have extra protections for prisoners?

- University of Pennsylvania
- Holmesburg Prison
- Atomic Energy Commission



IRB Composition

- A majority of the IRB members must have no association with the prison(s) involved
- At least one member of the IRB must be a prisoner or a prisoner representative with appropriate background and experience to serve in that capacity



Defining Prisoner

Any individual involuntarily confined or detained in a penal institution. This includes:

- individuals sentenced to such an institution under criminal or civil statute,
- individuals detained in other facilities by virtue of statutes or commitment procedures which provide alternatives to criminal prosecution or incarceration
- individuals detained pending arraignment, trial or sentencing



What do the regs allow?

- 1. Study of the possible causes, effects, and processes of incarceration, and of criminal behavior.
- 2. Study of prisons as institutional structures or of prisoners as incarcerated persons.
- Research on conditions particularly affecting prisoners as a class.
- 4. Research on practices, both innovative and accepted, which have the intent and reasonable probability of improving the health or well-being of the subjects



Consent Issues

- Free Choice
- Use of Incentives
- Confidentiality



Assessing Risk

- Harm in asking questions
- Breach of confidentiality



Required IRB Findings

- Must fall under one of the 4 categories mentioned earlier
- Any advantages...when compared to the general living conditions, are not of such a magnitude...that they impair the subjects ability to weigh risks/benefits
- Risks are commensurate with risks that would be accepted by non-prisoner volunteers



Required IRB Findings Continued

- Subject selection must be fair and immune from arbitrary intervention by prison authorities or prisoners
- Study info is presented in language understandable to the subject population
- Participants are clearly informed that research participation will have no effect on eligibility for parole



Other stuff about research with Prisoners

- Cannot be exempt
- Can be expedited*
- May be approved with a waiver or alteration of informed consent*
- If it is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, including (NIH), must be certified by OHRP.



All of these findings must be documented in the meeting minutes.
