

<u>Immigration Services – Office of Global Engagement</u>

- Mission: Provide visa sponsorships to all international students, scholars, and faculty at UGA; Advise on immigration regulations and benefits; Assist UGA departments with recruiting and hiring from around the world; process permanent resident petitions for eligible employees.
- Staff of 6 full-time advisors, 1 data manager, 1 graduate assistant, and the Director
- In a "normal" year we serve about 3,400 internationals per year.
- We offer advice and support for up to three years after an international student graduates from UGA


Spouses

- . Spouse may also be able to pursue permanent residence

Entrepreneur Parole - it's back, but ramping up slowly

- Up to 5 years, regardless of current status
- Based on strong business plan and showing that the experts agree
- This can be shown by significant investment by angel investor, government agency or other evidence.

The Biden-Harris Administration believes that one of America's greatest strengths is our ability to attract global talent to strengthen our economy and technological competitiveness, and benefit working people and communities all across the country.





Five Initiatives that does not require rulemaking or Congress

- 1. Expanded STEM OPT by adding 22 qualifying fields of study including Cloud Computing, Climate Science, Mathematical Economics, Business Analytics, Data Visualization, Financial Analytics
- 1. Updating O-1A visa criteria comparable evidence, compensation
- 1. Updating National Interest Waiver criteria critical fields list

Early Career STEM Research Initiative - use J-1 for work at private company

Expanding J-1 Academic Training after bachelors or masters degree





Case study #1

Postdoc is in second year of five years as a J-1 research scholar at university and gets offer for dream job in industry. Previously would try H-1B lottery, squeeze into subjective O-1 if employer will wait, or try self-petition green card.

Now , maybe able to use remaining J-1 time.





Case study #2

Company wants to sponsor employee for green card, but company does not yet have regular income to pay market rate salaries. Or realizes delays at Department of Labor for regular green card. Can try National Interest Waiver now if related to critical field list.
